5. REPORT OF OFFICERS AND AGENTS		
○ Audit Report	Shawn Strauss, Senior Manager, at Maher Duessel presented the financial statement report. For fiscal year 2022 the College received a clean opinion. Total assets for the College were approximately \$99.5 million compared to \$100 million for fiscal year 2021. Total liabilities for the College were \$62 million compared \$70.4 million in fiscal year 2021. Total operating revenues for the College were \$21 million compared to \$22 million in fiscal year 2021. Total operating expenses were \$77 million compared to \$66.5 million in fiscal year 2021. Total non-operating revenues were \$52.5 million compared to \$38.8 million in fiscal year 2021. The total change in net position in fiscal year 2022 was approximately \$5.7 million as compared to a loss of \$4 million in fiscal year 2021.	No question or comments.
o Foundation Report	Rebecca Brominski, Executive Director, Institutional Advancement and Foundation, reported during the first half of the fiscal year the Foundation raised over \$500,000 for our students. This was achieved by securing new endowments, additional scholarships, obtaining over \$350,000 in EITC tax credits, and surpassing our sponsorship goal by raising \$95,000 for our annual scholarship celebration. Mrs. Brominski publicly thanked her Institutional Advancement team for all of their hard work in helping us achieve our accomplishments.	
	The second annual Adopt a Trailblazer initiative saw great success. Due to the part of the generosity of our College family, trustees, and community partner the Askam Community Methodist Church. This initiative provided 65 students and their families with Thanksgiving meals. This included for the first time 25 students from our dedicated sites. The upcoming Schulman Gallery Art Exhibit will feature our very talented Faculty and Alumni. The LCCC Alumni Association annual Giving Day has seen quite a bit of success, raising over \$20,000 to date and the fundraising efforts run to June 30th, 2023.	
	Mrs. Brominski wished everyone a wonderful holiday season. President Leary stated that the College recently held a ribbon cutting

ceremony to commemorate the opening of the Student Life and Activities Lounge and E-Sports Arena. President Leary introduced Tyler Russell, Director of Student Life and Athletics and Kyle Davis, E-Sports Manager to speak about the program.

Tyler Russell stated he and Kyle Davis are excited to have this space for our students at Luzerne County Community College. Statistics show that students who are more engaged academically and socially at their colleges are more likely to return to college semester after semester, and students who persist at college are more like to graduate with a diploma or certificate, transfer to a 4-year university or find a job in their chosen field after they leave their college.

Mr. Russell noted the space provides different areas for our students. The first area is the Student Life Lounge, a simple space for students to get together and hang out, relax during their school day. The Student Life Lounge is a space where students can feel welcome, is accessible and a place where our students feel comfortable being in. The second space is the Trailblazers E-Sports Arena, a new, state of the art, gaming arena. And the third space is the Student Life and Athletics Office, near the back of the lounge. This is where you can Mr. Russell, Kyle Davis, and our secretary, Teddi Janosov who work in the office. When on campus we welcome you come in and say hello and get to know us.

In the Spring semester we will be starting our E-Sports programming and teams. We will be holding some intramural matches and open gaming times to help students get acclimated to the games we are going to be playing, and in the fall semester of 2023 we will have LCC's first varsity E-Sport teams ready to start formal competitions. Kyle Davis, the E-Sports Manager for the Student Life and Athletics Office, will be heading up the new E-Sports teams as they form. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me.

President Leary stated the opening of the new E-Sports Arena and Student Life Lounge is another example of the great accomplishments we have had at the Luzerne County Community College. That is always

	our focus – to provide the best opportunities for our students as they continue their education at Luzerne County Community College. President Leary stated this will be his focus over the next 18 months of his contract extension which was renewed in October 2023, noting there is more work to be done. President Leary emphasized he will continue to work with the Board, the faculty, staff and the President's Leadership Team in accomplishing the goals of our strategic plan and in our mission. President Leary announced that at the end of his contract in June of 2024, he will retire as President of the Luzerne County Community College. Board Chair Rodgers congratulated President Leary on his retirement announcement and thanked him for the many years of service to the College. Board Chair Rodgers noted, as President Leary stated there is a lot of work to be done under his direction, and Board Chair Rodgers is confident the work will be accomplished over the next 18 months. Board Chair Rodgers looks forward to working with President Leary and his staff and administration to make sure the focus is on our students so that all the projects are accomplished over the next 18 months. At this time, Board Chair Rodgers asked for everyone to join him in congratulating President Leary.
