	Vice President D'Allegro stated during the February 28, 2023, Board of	
	Trustees Board meeting she indicated there were to be three new	
	programs in the works. The Associate of Science in Public Health was	
	approved during the April Board meeting. This evening the College has	
	proposed for formal Board of Trustees approval, two new academic	
	programs. Neither of the two program proposals program will require	
	additional faculty, computers, or new or modified classrooms. Both	
	programs are one-year certificates of specialty at LCCC and are part of a	
	new initiative, a reconfiguration of some of our current academic	
	programs that will be more marketable and understandable to our	
	students and industry.	
	The advanced manufacturing technology certificate will provide	
	students teach them the basics of manufacturing and associated	
	technologies while affording the flexibility and skills and knowledge	
	acquisition of one of five different skill trade options. It quickly pivots to	
	short term training for micro-credentials. An individual can earn two or	
	more certifications at the completion of the degree. Both programs are	
	high-need programs.	
	At this time Mr. Babbish presented the Certificate of Specialty for	
	Advanced Manufacturing, providing an overview of the Thrive in Five	
	track offered through this program. The five tracks include: Electrical	
	Theory; Industrial Facility Maintenance; Computer Numeric Control	
	Technology; Plumbing and Heating and Air Conditioning and Welding.	

The Certificate of Specialty Game Art and Design takes the best of LCCC and Communication Arts and combines it with the existing digital design, fine arts, and programming. At this time Doug Martin, Department Chairperson and Assistant Professor, Communication Arts and Kevin Jones, Coordinator and Assistant Professor, Communication Arts provided an overview of the Game Art and Design program noting the global video game industry will grow by 73.8% from 2020-2027. Game art and design is a field with increasing interest from students in the local area. Job opportunities may increase in locations with more game studios. This certificate program would provide the knowledge required to transfer to 4-year institutions to continue their education. Game art and design integrates with current curriculums such as media and design; audio visual communications, fine arts; music recording technologies; mobile applications and web development and esports management. It was noted the typical program student would be traditional students interested in game art, game design, eSports and working adults interested in exploring a new career. Students enrolled in the Game Art and Design program typically attend, take part in and support eSports activities as part of their learning experience. President Leary expressed his appreciation to Mr. Babbish, Mr. Martin and Mr. Jones for their presentations.

President Leary reported three of the College's Heath Sciences programs: Nursing, Respiratory Therapy and Dental Hygiene achieved a 100% pass rate.

→ Foundation Report

Rebecca Brominski, Executive Director of Institutional Advancement/Foundation reported since the last gathering, the College hosted the annual Hybrid Legislative Information Session. This session brought over 60 guests to the campus both in person and virtually to hear from our faculty, students, staff, and elected officials. As a follow up to this event, we had several elected officials tour our campuses. Early June the College welcomed Senator Argall, Senator Watro and Representative Cabell along with staff to our Hazleton Campus for a tour of the facility, an in-depth demo, and to meet with some of our beginner ESL students.

Last week we welcomed Unted States Senator John Fetterman's staff Cody Forgach, Northeastern Regional Representative and Mikicia Weatherspoon, Eastern PA Director to our campus in Nanticoke. Touring several locations included PSTI, Technology Center which included a very interesting on-air interview with our broadcast students; the Health Sciences Building ending the day with a tour of our Culinary Institute with lunch created and served by our students and faculty.

2023 Student Arts Exhibit was held at the Schulman Galley Art Exhibit. 53 students represented by 129 artworks participated. On Friday, June 30th, an opening reception will be held in tribute to Michael Molnar who was a faculty member at the college for over 30 years and instrumental in getting the commercial arts program off the ground. All the artists are former students of Mr. Molnar whose lives were inspired by his talents.

The Foundation recently cut the ribbon and added a student clothing closet as a wraparound service to the Peter J. Lello Food Bank. The Trendy Trailblazer will assist students with a variety of clothing needs.

On July 13, 2023, at 10 a.m., the College, in partnership with the Luzerne Foundation and the family of the late Pasco L. Schiavo. will cut the ribbon and dedicate the new Pasco L. Schiavo Student Learning Commons at the Hazleton Center. This reinvented space will provide a collaborative learning environment for individual and group study as well as tutoring and instructional support.

To date, 730 students have applied for scholarships for the 2023-2024 academic year. This represents a 12% increase in applications from the previous year. 172 were awarded \$272,000 in scholarships and the remaining \$200,000 will be awarded over the next few weeks.

The 9th annual Alumni golf outing was a huge success. With 34 foursomes comprised of LCCC family, friends, and community supporters raised over \$18,000 to benefit the Luzerne County

	Community College Trailblazer Award Scholarship. Over 100 alumni, faculty and staff are participating in the 1st Annual Alumni Cruise. Updates and cruise happenings are being posted daily so check the LCCC social network page for pictures from the cruise. This past spring the Alumni association hosted the annual Dental Health Alumni Day, Annual Flea Market and Car Show. Plans are underway for the 50th anniversary nursing reunion and fall craft festival. For all they do to support the College and for our students the Foundation surprised the Alumni Association as Donor of the Month. They will be recognized again at our 40th Foundation Scholarship Dinner in November.
