5. REPORT OF OFFICERS AND AGENTS		
President's Report	Thomas P. Leary, President, was pleased to report Luzerne County Community College's Fall 2023 enrollment increased by 2.5% as	

compared to the Fall 2022 enrollment. Relevant to the College's annual budget projections, the enrollment reflects a 7% increase on an annualized basis. I wish to acknowledge the efforts of our Admissions, Marketing, and the staff at LCCC's seven centers in the accomplishment of this increase.

President Leary noted he recently met with the Superintendent of the Greater Nanticoke School District to discuss a proposed agreement to enroll high school students in the areas of technology and trades in the College's Early College program. LCCC is a regional leader in these programs, and we wish to enhance the opportunities for these students to learn of these professional opportunities.

The Pennsylvania Library Association announced the 2023 New Librarian of the Year is Alyssa Coleman, Digital Services Librarian at Luzerne County Community College. LCCC is very proud of Alyssa and the contribution she has made to our students and to the community.

On October 18th, the College will hold its second college-wide Professional Development Day Program. Adam Blannard, Director of the Wilkes Barre Center will serve as Emcee. The program includes several departmental updates and breakout sessions for our faculty, staff, and administration.

At the end of this week President Leary reported he will join his colleagues at the PA Commission for Community Colleges' Council of Presidents meeting scheduled for October 19 and 20<sup>th</sup> in Harrisburg to discuss the new higher education plan that has been proposed.

Luzerne County Community College will hold a Fall Open House on Saturday, October 28 from 9:30 a.m. to noon, at the college's Campus Center. Information on programs of study, financial aid, student activities and athletics, transfer and dual admission agreements, health sciences admission, English as a Second Language (ESL), and student services will be available, and tours of the campus will be given.

On November 9th, LCCC will host the Luzerne County Regional College Fair from 6 to 7:30 p.m., at the College's Campus Center.

Representatives from close to 75 colleges, universities, and the armed

6B. Appointment of the Next President

6B. Robert Bertoni, Chair of the Presidential Search Committee and Vice Chair of the Board of Trustees thanked the 7-members of the Presidential Search Committee who served for the past 10 months for all the time and effort they put in. The College received more than 40 applicants for the position of President. After eliminating some of the applications for not meeting the minimum qualifications the candidate pool was streamlined down to 6 applicants and interviewed all 6 of them. The search committee unanimously agreed to move three candidates forward for in person interviews. Each candidate's scores were determined by the search committee to be the strongest candidate for their performance during their interview and their experience. Prior to the second interview Dr. Keating and Dr. Graham took on the task of drafting interview questions. Ouestions included a metrics to assist

Each candidate was provided with a copy of the faculty bargaining agreement, current Treasurer's Report and the LCCC Self Study Middle State Commission of Higher Education. Each candidate was also informed they would be asking specific questions about each of these three documents. Prior to the second round of interview the resumes were shared with all Board members and Board members were invited to attend the final interviews as well as a representative from the administrative Dr. Mary Lou D'Allegro, Vice President of Academic Affairs. On September 12th interviews begin at 4:30 p.m. and concluded at approximately 9:30 p.m. At the conclusion of the interviews Board members and the members from the administration were asked for their feedback.

At this time, Robert Bertoni made a motion for the consideration, nomination, and appointment of John Yudichak to be the next President of Luzerne County Community College, subject to the College and Mr. Yudichak negotiating a mutually agreeable employment contract.

During the roll call vote Trustee Janes Dennis thanked the committee on seven months of research. John Yudichak has an impeccable record as State Representative and Senator – he is a pillar in his eyes of Northeastern Pennsylvania and he is local. One of the best decisions he can make for the administration, faculty and students is to vote of John Yudichak as the next President.

Board Chair O'Donnell also thanked the members of the selection committee and the entire Board of Trustees for the time attention and effort demonstrated to this important matter over the last ten months, you have demonstrated fidelity as fiduciaries of the College. Board Chair O'Donnell also took the opportunity to thank President Leary for his exemplary tenure, his dedication and his continued assurances to her for a smooth transition as the process continues.

The initial agreement will be for a period of three (3) and a half years (January 1, 2024 through June 30, 2027) with an option to renew for an additional two (2) year period (to June 30, 2029) based on performance and mutual agreement.  They will be compensated based on hourly rates for projects for work including but not limited to the initial consultation and project investigation, project specifications and design, cost estimate, and preparation of bid documents. If the College decides to proceed with the project, any additional architectural and engineering fees will be compensated by a predetermined percent of construction cost for work including but not limited to the finalization of bid documents, bidding, mandatory pre-bid meeting, bid opening, evaluation of bids and recommendation of award, contract administration, and project management through the completion of the project.  The College has a budgeted amount for general architectural and engineering fees. Approval for specific, larger, projects are based on priority and identified funding.
